Held the first chapel service in the new chapel before it was dedicated. He wanted the first classmen to enjoy a service in the building they had seen built during their time on campus. He always thought of cadets first.

His prayers were incredible! When saying the opening prayer at football games, he loved God's creation and you knew it! If there was an exceptionally beautiful sunset, he mentioned it! He always included prayers for the players on both teams that no one got hurt.

He performed the first funeral ever held in the chapel as well as countless weddings. One particular wedding rehearsal had been completed and the participants had gone outside when they heard the Polo Bell ring. Another cadet had died. Vern went from celebrating the beginning of a new couple's life to that of comforting.

I introduced him to Betty Baker, a Roswell realtor, whom he later married. She was the love of his life. She quit selling houses and became immersed in NMMI, supporting Vern, comforting mothers on Matriculation Day. They had many joyous years together.

He and Betty loved hooking the travel trailer up and taking off for the wild blue yonder! One summer's camping trip involved several couples from NMMI who went to Big Bend National Park (Texas), so the guys could "ride the rapids down the Rio Grande River" in the roy-aks. The trip included a trip to The Basin where the weather changed and it started snowing on everyone! Vern let us know that there humor in the situation!

He had a sixth sense in that he knew when you were having a bad day. Numerous people have told me "he would walk up beside me, put his arm around me and keep walking with me – never asking what was going on". He counseled cadets, teachers, and staff. I think he was everyone's confidant! And he impacted the lives of everyone he met!

I saw a plaque in a restaurant recently that pretty much sums up Vern's Life: Live Simply, Love Generously, Care Deeply, Speak Kindly, Leave the Rest to God.

Rest in peace, my friend.

CHP Vernon R. Edmondson, USAF (Ret) Honorary Life Member passed away on 18 October 2015. Chaplain Edmondson was a graduate of Southern California College, Berkley Baptist Divinity School and New Mexico State University. After his ordainment he was commissioned in the USAF as Chaplain where he served for 20 years during the period of 1953-1973, achieving the rank of Colonel (O-6). Edmondson was on active duty in the USA, Europe, as well as Thailand during the Vietnam War. After retirement from the USAF, he then served as Chaplain at the New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell for 14 years, retiring from NMMI in 1987. Many NMMI Cadets looked to him not only for spiritual guidance but also as a role model and mentor. After his "second retirement" from the Chaplaincy, he pastored at the First Christian Church of Roswell until relocating to Ruidoso with his wife Betty in 1997. Continuing his spiritual calling in Ruidoso, he served as Pastor of the First

Presbyterian Church of Ruidoso followed by the Ruidoso First Christian Church. He is survived by his sister Geneva; his daughter Barbara; his sons Paul, Allen, Brad and Clark; his eight grandchildren; and his seven great-grandchildren.

When I was asked to write about Vern Edmondson I developed a writer's block and so I pondered a bit. I reflected on the my early days as a NMMI cadet starting in the early 1970s when Vern first came to NMMI. Prior to Vern Edmondson at NMMI, our early chapel days were held in Pearson Auditorium. My reflection of days prior to the NMMI Memorial Chapel services are linked to an image of a large wooden cross that was hung from a ceiling wire or rope on Sunday's Christian services among the red and taupe colored stage drapes. The cross appeared each Sunday sometime after the Saturday night movies that played for the cadets at the same venue the night before. The previous Chaplain to Vern Edmondson did a good job until one day he announced he was retiring. Soon thereafter, Vern Edmondson was introduced as the new NMMI Chaplain. He immediately struck us cadets as a man that had a knack for cheering up the services as Vern always had a great big smile throughout his services. I remember his services as being positive and stimulating while delivering his message and purpose for the week. His legacy quickly took a different turn at NMMI when he became the first Chaplain of the brand new NMMI Alumni Memorial Chapel. So for the Chapel's first approximate 14 years of existence the cadets had the benefit and honor of knowing our friend and Chaplain Vern Edmonson. His daily uniform was Air Force Blue and a very big warm positive smile. If hand salutes would ever be considered part of sign language they would chose Vern's as the most pleasing gesture. He was very approachable and a warm servant to all.

Vern was close to the cadets and school staff while he was there. He continued to be a friend to many alumni and associates and was a familiar face after his own retirement in 1987 from NMMI through his and his wife Betty's attendance at many homecoming events. He was an Honorary Alumnus and he was also a frequent special guest of the honored classes at their homecoming dinners. Everyone looked forward to seeing Vern at homecomings and periodic functions along with their other favorite faces sought after from their respective days at NMMI. He conducted marriage services for several alumni at locations in and out of our cherished NMMI Alumni Memorial Chapel. He also was nurturing during sorrowful times to alumni, cadets and NMMI families.

Just prior to learning that his cancer had returned, Vern was one of the first to register for the 2015 NMMI Homecoming events. He was also invited to be an honored guest at the Class of 1975 Reunion Dinner. Once he learned the cancer had returned, he had to cancel his plans to attend Homecoming; and through social media he told us of his plans to temporarily relocate to the Houston, Texas, area for a short period of time for the needed cancer treatments. Unfortunately, Vern passed away just days before the NMMI Homecoming and the 1975 Class Reunion Dinner; but his spirit and enthusiasm was with us as we honored his life and his influences in

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several ways at our 1975 Class Reunion Dinner. Class leaders decided to dedicate a bench in the DeSanders Alumni Memorial Plaza in honor of Vern Edmondson. Two awesome iron NMMI memorabilia items that were handcrafted by alumnus Scott Buckles 1975 HS - 1977 JC were donated as auction items at the class dinner to raise money for Vern's bench. The two items alone raised \$1,300.00 toward payment of the bench. Other donations have since arrived for the cause and we only need about \$800.00 more to complete the payment for the bench. Alumni and friends continue to make donations toward the payment of Vern's bench. The bench committee has decided that any funds received over the balance due for the bench in memory of Vern Edmondson, will be transferred to the NMMI Foundation for a scholarship in Vern's memory.
