Yesterday, our courageous Berrendo Middle School students returned to school after a school shooting that took place on 14 January 2014. Their first encounter was a group of folks lining the street providing plenty of cheers and support. Next, they were treated to a beautiful view of the largest "Old Glory" they have ever seen, towering over their school, and flapping in the wind. Finally, as they entered the school they noticed NMMI cadets greeting them and encouraging them. Two parents texted me and my own son, all told me, that when they saw the cadets they told their parents, "Everything will be alright."



I concluded that NMMI cadets represent a great deal of normalcy for the Roswell children, a role cadets shouldn't take lightly.

Yesterday, I had the distinct privilege to escort the cadets to Berrendo Middle School to display banners of hope and support as well as to share hugs with teachers and students. They were invited to the front doors, and inside to hang the banners, which I assume adorn the hallways today along with many others from around Roswell and the State. I had no idea what a difference their presence would make, not only to the students, but to the adults. Particularly, the staff at Berrendo Middle School, Roswell Independant School District, First Responders and the Governor's staff who all thanked the cadets for their support and participation.

We are all now receiving phone calls thanking the NMMI family for allowing and doing what was done. I, like Pilar, consider them all our children. We witnessed pain and anxiety in the faces of not only the students, but also the parents, faculty and others. However, I have been told several times of the strength that was gathered when the cadets were seen; "my son saw them, pulled his shoulders back and stuck his chest out saying, 'Dad, it's going to be alright, the cadets are here."

When we returned, I quickly spoke to the 18 or so cadets thanking them for the effort and remarking that they would likely never realize the difference they made in so many young folks' and now, older folks' lives. They were not seeking credit, just a desire to help heal; to serve others. The credit is added to them.

What a privilege and honor to be here at NMMI serving them!

DID YOU KNOW?

"Army announces major change to retired military customs and courtesies"

WASHINGTON — Some customs and courtesies will never change, such as showing respect for the U. S. flag. However, the Army recently modified how retirees list their retired status. The Army published the new policy on 17 May in Army Regulation 25-50, Preparing and Managing Correspondence. The policy puts retired Reservists on equal footing with Soldiers who retired from active duty.

AR 25-50 says, "Retired military should follow the same rules as active personnel, except that no organization or branch of the Army will be shown. Show retired status after the grade as follows:

All Army personnel, active or reserve component, retired for service, age or physical disability and all personnel on the Army of the United States Retired List, including regular Army personnel and non-regular Army personnel on the Temporary Disability Retired List will use 'USA Retired' (for example, A.B. Smith, COL (USA Retired).

All personnel on the Officers Honorary Retired List will use 'U.S. Army Retired (Hon).'

All Reservists assigned to the U. S. Army Reserve (USAR) Control Group (Retired) will use 'USA Retired.'

Army retirees serving as DA civilians will not use or refer to their military grade or rank except when referring to their personal retirement actions."



Vice Admiral Patrick J. Hannifin, USN (Ret) 1942 JC passed away 9 January 2014. Admiral Hannifin was inducted into the NMMI Alumni Hall of Fame in 1985 as a flag officer. Following his NMMI training he entered the United States Naval Academy, graduating in 1944. His career in the submarine service of the U. S. Navy included command of the USS DIODON and the USS LAFAYETTE, the first of a new class of Poseidon missile submarines. As a flag officer, Admiral Hannifin has been Commandant of the Thirteenth Naval District, Commander of Submarine Flotilla Eight and Commander Submarines Mediterranean NATO. In 1977 he was appointed director of the Joint Staff, Washington, DC.



With his retirement in 1978, Vice Admiral Hannifin concluded 37 years of naval service to his country. He was a beloved father, grandfather and great grandfather.



On Wednesday morning, 14 January 2014, off duty New Mexico State Police **1LT Gary L. Smith 1994 JC** was dropping off his sixth grade son, Jacob, at Berrendo Middle School in Roswell, NM when he was flagged down by the school principal. She told him there was an active shooter inside the school. Lieutenant Smith was the first law enforcement officer at the scene. He entered the gymnasium and gave the shooter clear instructions to turn around and get on the ground. He and others immediately began first aid on the wounded. The paramedics and other officers arrived within four minutes.



This past December, **CPT Jefferey V. Geraci, USA 2004 JC**, assumed command of Echo Troop, 2-6 Calvary Regiment, 25th Combat Aviation Brigade, 25th Infantry Division, Wheeler Army Airfield, Hawaii. CPT Geraci is a Logistics Officer and commands an aviation forward support troop. CPT Geraci is the son of NMMI's Commandant of Cadets, **BG Richard V. Geraci, USA (Ret) 1975 JC.**

Capt Douglas G. Barnett, USAF 2000 JC grew up in Corsicana, TX, and graduated from that high school in 1997. He wasn't the best student and knew he lacked the direction and focus to be successful at the collegiate level. Barnett's father, an American Airlines Captain at the time, met a co-worker whose son was attending the Institute and thought it was worth taking a look at. His older brother LTJG Andrew K. Barnett, USN 1999 JC attended the Institute the following semester, matriculating at the beginning of the school year in 1997, and Barnett followed him the next semester. He spent four semesters at the Institute and graduated from the Junior College in December of 1999. Following graduation Barnett attended Saint Edwards University and graduated from there in 2002.

After college, he attended Air Force OTS, Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training (SUPT), and began flying the C-5 Galaxy with the 68th Airlift Squadron at Lackland AFB in San Antonio, TX. He transferred to the 96th Flying Training Squadron at Laughlin AFB, TX, in 2009 and currently trains new AF aviators in the T-6 Texan II.

"Both my brother and I consider the Institute as perhaps the integral piece that focused our potential and allowed us to succeed in our chosen careers," Barnett said. He is currently an F\A-18 Hornet pilot.




LTC Anthony P. Bolante, WAARNG 1987 JC was named cyclist of the month by Cascade Bicycle Club.



Chuck hosted the Phoenix Alumni Chapter annual "Wilder Barbeque" at his ranch for many years.

CHARLES V. WILDER, JR. 1948 JC passed away 2 April 2013 at his ranch home in New River, AZ. Chuck was born on 21 March 1929 to Charles Vincent and Ella (McFarland) Wilder in Bellingham, WA. In 1943 Chuck enrolled at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, NM. He attended through two years of college and maintained a relationship with the school throughout his life. After graduation from NMMI, he continued his education at the University of Washington, earning his Civil Engineering degree in 1951. Following graduation, he reported for duty in the U.S. Army and was assigned to the Engineer Aviation Brigade Headquarters. He left the service in 1953 as a first lieutenant and returned to Bellingham to become a member of the Wilder Construction team. During the next ten years he worked in all aspects of the company, learning and advancing in responsibilities until he became president in 1963. Because of his vision and expertise, the company continued to grow and expand its operations to other states in the Northwest. In June of 1974, Wilder Construction opened its Alaskan Division in Anchorage, becoming a highly respected contractor throughout the state. Wilder's name was synonymous with excellence in the asphalt pavement industry. Wilder Construction was awarded the largest single highway contract by the State of Alaska Department of Transportation in 1981. The project required excavating millions of cubic yards of solid rock. Wilder designed the project using highly innovative and efficient conceptual ideas that kept the traffic flowing while completing the complicated task ahead of schedule. Chuck believed that the Wilder employees were its most important asset. The firm enjoyed one of the best reputations in the Northwest and Alaska by maintaining the high standards set by his father, C.V. Wilder, Sr. The transition from a family-owned to an employee-owned company was accomplished in 1994. Granite Construction, Inc. of Watsonville, CA, began its acquisition of the company in early 2000. Chuck achieved the ultimate respect from his peers by being elected president of the Asphalt Paving Association of Washington, the Mountain Pacific Chapter of Associated General Contractors, and the National Asphalt Pavement Association. He was also honored as Whatcom County Business Person of the Year. His leadership and caring for the many employees that worked for him were hallmarks of NMMI's credo of Duty, Honor and Achievement. Chuck was inducted into the NMMI Hall of Fame in 2001 for Eminence in his Chosen Field of Endeavor. As an entrepreneur in the business world, Chuck generously supported various organizations including the Western Foundation at Western Washington University, the Arne Hanna Swimming Pool in Bellingham, Shriner's Children's Hospital and Hospice of the Valley in Arizona. Wilder arranged for \$1,000,000 to go to the New Mexico Military Institute Foundation Inc., as well as deeding his Arizona Ranch to the Boy Scouts of America. He loved NMMI and wanted to ensure that generations of young people would have the opportunity to attend the school that gave him his foundation for success in his life.


