


Honoring our heroes:

Lieutenant Colonel Albert E. Smart, USA 1983 JC, died at the age of 42 on May 28, 2005, at an Air Force hospital in Doha, Qatar, from a non-combat illness. He was a Civil Affairs officer assigned to the 321st Civil Affairs Brigade out of San Antonio, TX. He had deployed earlier in the month to Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. LTC Smart graduated from John Jay High School in San Antonio in 1981, and later graduated from the New Mexico Military Institute, and Wayland Baptist University. He enlisted in the Army Reserve in 1983 and was originally commissioned as an infantry officer. His military education and training included the Civil Affairs Qualification Course, basic airborne course, and the U.S. Army Ranger course. LTC Smart's awards and decorations include the Joint Service Commendation Medal, three Army Commendation Medals, 3 Army Achievement Medals, the parachutist badge, and Ranger tab. LTC Smart valiantly served our nation and his fellow Soldiers. He is survived by his wife, son, and his parents.

When **CW3 Darrell B. Hovland, USA (Ret) 1981 HS - 1983 JC** graduated from NMMI he knew he wanted to serve in the US Army. He returned to the Hill for Junior College and joined the Senior ROTC program. After his second class year due to unforeseen changes he left the institute and did not return his First Class year and dropped from the ROTC program. Still wanting to serve the military he enlisted in the US Army Reserves and graduated Infantry One Station Unit Training (OSUT) at Ft Benning, GA just a few weeks from when his peers would be graduating from NMMI and getting their commissions in the US Army. He returned to the Hill as a Private First Class to watch his best friend Kirk Johnson receive his Commission and give him his first salute. Darrell went on to serve in the 1st Ranger BN, 75th Inf Rgmt (ABN) at Hunter Army Air Field, Savannah, GA. Later applied for Special Forces and graduated from the United States Army Special Forces Qualification Course, Ft Bragg, NC, and was assigned to 5th

Special Forces Group (ABN) Ft Campbell, KY. He served in Special Forces from 1988 until his retirement in 2004. While serving, tragedy struck his family with the death of the mother of their 11 year old son due to complications of diabetes, in Jan 2001 leaving him a single parent. Although, he served four combat tours in different conflicts from Desert Storm, Somalia, Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan, and Iraqi Freedom in Iraq, Darrell says the hardest thing he ever had to do was tell his son his mother was not coming home. Darrell Retired from the US Army in Nov 2004 as a Chief Warrant Officer 3. He met his wife COL Michele (Melton) Hovland. She was serving in the Missouri National Guard and was selected as the first Female Brigade Commander in the MO NG for the 70th Troop Command she was additionally the first female from the Missouri Army National Guard to be selected to attend the United States Army War College Residence Course in Carlisle, PA. Darrell and Michele were married in 2009 and spent their first year together in Carlisle at the War College. After War College they returned to their farm in Missouri. Michele retired from the National Guard as a senior leader in the MO NG in 2012. During Michele's service she served 11 years on active duty and 19 years in the National Guard both in California and Missouri. During her service she too served in combat during Desert Storm and deployed numerous guard Soldiers to both Afghanistan and Iraq. While in the California NG she was selected to be the Commandant of Angel Gate Academy at Camp San Louis Obispo, CA. Angel Gate Academy was a California National Guard program for at risk kids from the unified Los Angeles School District. During her time as camp Commandant she found her passion for working with youth and upon her return to MO dreamt of starting a kid's camp. Darrell and Michele spoke often about putting together a kids camp on their farm in the Ozarks of SW Missouri but didn't know what it would look like but after both had served in combat and attended too many memorial services for fellow soldiers and friends, and seeing the kids sitting on the front row at these memorial services they knew what kind of kids camp to build. Because both of them had suffered the loss of a loved one, Michele losing her first husband to Heart disease they knew too well what that experience is like. Thus was the beginning of Kids of Our Heroes - Adventure Camp. Not really know what they were doing, and both being too stubborn to not achieve what they set out to do, they started to put together a board of directors and filed for the camp's Non-Profit Status and Jan 2013 held their first Board Meeting. When looking for quality board members Darrell of course thought of his longtime friend COL Kirk Johnson 1981 HS - 1982 JC from the Institute who both had served on the same military posts throughout their careers. Kirk eagerly accepted the invitation to serve on the board while he prepared for his own retirement. He brought with him his wife Mary Kate (Patterson) Johnson 1982 HS -1984 JC who were recently married in 2013.

VP **Dan Castillo 1982 JC** proudly told Mr. Sinise that 100% of TDVA's 501©(3) nonprofit monetary donations go directly to veterans in various programs which can be viewed at www.TDVA. net and our free online membership is continuously growing since January 2009 as a veterans' service organization! Over 7,000 patients, medical staff members, veterans, and family members enjoyed cold beverages, barbecued food with all the trimmings, and music featuring, Gary Sinise and the Lt. Dan Band also featuring Robert Irvine. Actor Sinise has made eight appearances in San Antonio since 2007 visiting veterans and wounded warriors. Castillo told Mr. Sinise that, "I am the original Lt. Dan", Mr. Sinise smiled and a friendship of mutual respect for veterans and military service members began!

The Gary Sinise Foundation recently announced the upcoming Sixth Annual, Lt. Dan Weekend (LDW6) and registration is currently now open online! LDW6 will consist of a Veteran/Caregiver retreat taking place at the Independence Center on Palm Key, SC from 13-17 September 2015 for fifty lucky Independence Heroes who will then be joined by another three hundred Independence Heroes and caregivers the weekend of 17-19 September 2015 in Charleston, SC. The Lt. Dan concert will take place on Friday, Sept 18th. The Independence Fund will provide meals, lodging and a travel stipend up to \$500 for each approved participant. Applications will be accepted from now until Aug. 15th. Those not accepted as Independence Heroes will still be eligible to receive a pair of VIP passes to the Lt. Dan Band concert taking place in the North Charleston Coliseum on September 18, 2015. Doors to the concert will open at 5:30 p.m.. The LDW6 website, www.LDW6.org went live on June 10, 2015 and contains more information as it becomes available.

About the Camp:

Kids of Our Heroes – Adventure Camp is Nestled along beautiful Flat Creek in the Ozarks of Southwest Missouri, about 45 miles west of Branson, MO near a quaint little community of Jenkins, MO, The Camp is a Non-Profit Corporation in the State of Missouri and has it 501 C (3) status granted by the IRS. It is governed by 8 Directors who sit on its Board and are only paid by the knowledge that there are doing great thing for these kids. All of its board members are Veterans with the majority serving in combat. All of the Camp staff are veterans with all of the Camp Counselors holding a degree in Counseling and Michele being the lead counselor as a Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC). Each camp is a week-long camp for kids 11 - 17 years of age unaccompanied by their parents or guardian. Currently there are two camps during the summer; the first is for Kids who have lost a loved one Killed in Action during the Global War on Terror; the second is for kids who live with a Wounded Warrior with either seen or unseen wounds. Each day the kids are taken out on a daily adventure which is paired with a counseling theme, coping skill, and Bible verse. Kids of all religious faiths are welcome to attend however; the verses are used to help give direction and purpose when faced with tough situations. The whole idea of the camp is to challenge the kids to face fears that they may not have faced before. For if they can overcome their fears they can overcome other challenges that they may face. Currently they are taking 16 campers per camp and have one counselor to every 4 campers. The camp is primitive camping and the campers live in tents and sleep on cots in a fashion similar to what their parent might have done while serving in the military. They are also working to run a third camp for those kids whose parent served and unfortunately committed suicide. Getting additional funds and counselors for this camp is a work in progress. The Camp is solely funded by private donations and are able to keep costs down due to being run on Darrell and Michele's farm and because of the close proximity to Branson, MO which is one of the most patriotic cities and the businesses that provided some of the adventures, either give it gratis or at a greatly reduced rate for the campers. The local communities in SW MO and numerous Veteran and civic organizations have embraced the camp and have helped out greatly with everything from funding to helping with construction projects and thereby making the Camp totally free to the campers once they arrive at camp. In 2016 they will be adding kids of Fallen Police Officers and Firefighters to our Gold Star Kids Camp. Those who have lost a loved one Killed in the line of service and are very excited to bring on a 22 year veteran of the police force as a camp counselor. After almost 30 years Darrell returned to the hill for the 2013 Homecoming. For him it was very grounding after being away for so long and serving overseas and in combat which seemed to always happen during his 10 and 20 year reunion. Darrell says he seemed too had forgotten that part of his life after being so far removed from it serving his country. He says he can only describe it as Grounding to come back to where he grew up and reconnecting with other alumni. One of those alumni was Karen Wall (NMMI JC 1982) who was interested in helping out with the camp and with her background as a RN in Psychology and family therapy was a great fit and will be a camp counselor this year in Aug. Darrell says he owes so much of his success not only with the camp but in his Army career to what he learned at the Institute, from time management and invaluable leadership skills to how to surround yourself with

successful people and high achievers in order to make yourself a better person. Darrell also says of the Institute that although it might not be the exact same place that he remembers it still has the ability to create and prepare leaders for tomorrow and one important fact is the role that the Alumni play in setting the example for the cadets of today and staying involved and committed to all things taking place on the old post. Although he was not able to return to the Institute for so long he has kept in touch with numerous friends he made while at the Institute throughout the years. For the friendships that are formed as a cadet will never fully be realized for years to come as to where they may lead.

The San Antonio Military Medical Center (SAMMC) formerly Brooke General Hospital (BGH) is situated at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas, and is part of Brooke Army Medical Center (BAMC) and the U.S. Army Medical Command. BAMC is the command element over all Army medical facilities in the San Antonio area, including SAMMC. It is a University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and USUHS teaching hospital and is home to the Army Burn Center. The hospital today is a 425-bed Joint Commission-accredited facility, expandable to 653 beds in the event of disaster. Services include general medical and surgical care, adult and pediatric primary care clinics, 24-hour Emergency department, specialty clinics, clinical services, wellness and prevention services, veterinary care, and environmental health services. SAMMC is a Level I trauma center, the only stateside one in the MEDCOM, and is part of the Southern Regional Medical Command. Within the SAMMC complex is the Center for the Intrepid which has a threefold mission which is to provide rehabilitation for OIF/OEF casualties who have sustained amputation, burns, or functional limb loss, to provide education to DoD and Department of Veteran's Affairs professionals on cutting edge rehabilitation modalities, and to promote research in the fields of orthopedics, prosthetics and physical/occupational rehabilitation. The staff and equipment for the building was selected to provide the full spectrum of amputee rehabilitation as well as the advanced outpatient rehabilitation for burn victims and limb salvage patients with residual functional loss. Just outside the gates of SAMMC there is a building called the Wounded Warriors Transition Barracks where recently injured and wounded military personnel who have recovered at SAMMC continue their ongoing physical and mental therapies as they return back to military service or transition back into civilian life. SAMMC has cared for thousands of service members who were injured in Operations Iragi Freedom and Enduring Freedom and military operations throughout the world, and nearly 1,500 medical professionals have been deployed in support of those missions. Since the Global War on Terrorism began in September 2001, the Burn Team has made frequent trips to Landstuhl Army Regional Medical Center in Germany, transporting patients back to SAMMC for care.
