

Alumni Updates

MAJ William P. "Bill" Shaw, NMMI passed away on Sunday, 25 October 2015. Bill served as a NMMI Troop Leadership Advisor from 1992 - 2011, receiving the rank of NMMI Major. Prior to coming to NMMI, Bill served his country in the United States Army as Special Forces/Green Beret officer, from where he retired with distinction. Major Shaw's voice reminds me of NMMI. His quotes as we marched off to BRC like "morning gang" and "looks like another culinary delight" remind me of the "home" I had at NMMI for six years. Shaw will be missed, but I've never missed his Daily Room Inspections since graduation-Adam Wayne Camp 2006 HS~2008 JC

I remember I had snuck behind the tennis courts with a female cadet and was in the middle of some public display of affection when all of a sudden MAJ Shaw jumps out of the tree we were sitting under. He scared the living hell out of us. I swear he could sneak up on you before you even knew he was there. He was a hell of a guy. RIP MAJ Shaw – P. Brandon Cruz 2000 HS~2002 JC

P. Brandon Cruz 2000 HS~2002 JC MAJ Shaw running through the box and yelling, "It's a great day in the USA." He had such enthusiasm and had a demeanor that was infectious. MAJ Shaw could relate to the cadets very well. His rigorous discipline was as testimony to others; his was a leadership by example. Further, he was a deep reader. He would often write op-ed pieces to the Roswell Daily Record on a variety of topics. He wore his beliefs, his views on his sleeve. I think the term that would best jump out would be respect. I certainly know a great many cadets who owe MAJ Shaw a tremendous amount for what they are today. I am very sorry to hear about his passing, LTC Billy S. Gallagher, NMMI I probably knew MAJ Shaw better than anyone else on post. We were friends for the last 20 years. We worked together as TLAs for four years before I moved to the faculty. Bill was from a very prominent Virginia Family. In his youth he was very "wild" and the family sent

him and his brother to Christian Military School at age 11! Bill was very influenced by the old World War II and Korean War NCOs he had at military school. Bill graduated from the University of Virginia and was a brilliant scholar. MAJ Shaw was fluent in Spanish, spoke conversational German and was fond of reading Cicero, Virgil and the Roman Stoics in the original Latin. Bill was commissioned as a Lieutenant in Military Intelligence and he served his 20 year career as a fully certified Green Beret. Bill served behind Soviet lines in Eastern Europe during the height of the Cold War. He also operated in Central America against the Sandinistas. Bill was not allowed to wear the Purple Heart for war wounds because he was shot in the leg in Beirut, Lebanon, when the government said we had no troops there. When he retired from the Army Bill came to NMMI. He loved the cadets and his job as a TLA. Bill practiced "tough love." I don't think he ever wrote a stick on a cadet. Bill much preferred correctional PT for cadets and usually did the PT with them. His favorite quote when cadets were about to do something stupid was "I'll kick your butt through the goal post of life!" Bill always stayed in shape so he could keep up with the cadets. He kept a cadet M1903 Springfield rifle in his barracks apartment which he used in his daily workouts. When I was teaching World History, MAJ Shaw would fascinate the high school cadets with verses from Roman poetry, the history of the Roman Legions and Roman tactics and technology. Bill Shaw was always an enigma - He led a cadet bible study, met Chaplain Musgrave at the chapel every morning for prayer and bible study and helped with the Protestant Chapel services. On the other hand, Bill could say an entire paragraph in profanity and be grammatically correct. Bill could be the ultimate warrior/ Green Beret and turn around and be the perfect Southern Gentleman. Bill's greatest goal was to help every cadet grow in character and in leadership. He even published a small text on Ethics. MAJ Shaw devoted the later part

of his life to mentoring cadets at NMMI



and other schools. Those of us who knew him will greatly miss him. LTC John K. Umberger, NMMI

He became a TLA when I was in HS. He also swore me in for my oath of office. I remember him telling us his favorite weapon was an icepick, so he could stick it to an intruders spine at the base of their neck. Shaw-Dog. LTC Jason E. Garcia, USAR 1993 HS-1995 JC

MAJ Shaw was a Night TAC with stealth powers. We joked about him being a ghost. He rolled his steps so as to not make a sound, and his black trench coat made him blend into the mysteries of the night. If our stoop windows were open, very often the shades would release-rolling up in a flash. During the quiet of NSH or Late Lights, such a commotion could be startling. Was it the rumored Ghost of Juliette Troop? Was it the breeze? Or was it just MAJ Shaw? Who knows... He could sneak up on anyone anywhere. He got great joy from outsmarting us cadets.

I hope some of the really old cadets or alumni will tell the story of his reaction to Bin Laden's capture. Evidently, he spoke and emoted more in those few minutes than during his entire NMMI career. :) He was a legend! - MAJ Christina M. Parsley, NMMI 1996 HS~1998


