

Each year Shawn and I have challenged alumni, family and friends in the months leading up to the General's Cup. We continue to do this because the impact this event has on current/future cadets can't be put into words or overlooked. Over the course of that time, this event has created an endowment of approximately \$218,000 and has also provided over \$37,000 in scholarship funds to prospective and current cadets. In Poland, we saw where the assassination attempt was made on Hitler's life and where the Polish resistance fought the Nazis (Warsaw Rising). In Germany, we saw Berlin and the border crossing between the former East and West Germany at Helmstedt and Marienborn. Ín

addition, we visited Observation Post Alpha (OPA), near Geisa, Germany. OPA is the place where World War 3 would have started when Russian and Warsaw Pact tanks would have crossed into then West Germany. We also visited Hitler's Eaglesnest, the stadiums in Nuremburg where the Nazi party rallies took place, and the Palace of Justice where the war crimes trials where held after the Second World War. In Frankfurt, we drove past the IG Farben building where the Nazi military industrial complex was managed from. We also visited the Carl Schurz Seidlung where Jim lived as a teenager from 1970 until 1973 (Jim's Dad was assigned to the FAA's Frankfurt Flight Inspection Office at this time).

National Guard officers were meeting for the first time during Operation Vigilant Guard. Operation Vigilant Guard is a Joint Regional Exercise Program. The Vermont National

The new Bronco men's head tennis coach has a lot in common with his predecessor, which is a big plus for the program.

William A. O'Connell 2011 JC, who left the position after the successful spring 2016 program to further his education as well as play more himself, was a former New Mexico Military Institute netter who played two years under coach Gene Hardman, then went on to play at a four-year school.

New head coach Daniel Dominguez is also a NMMI alum, who played in 2007 and 2008 under Hardman. Those Bronco squads qualified for nationals both seasons and were ranked in the top 10 in 2008.

The El Paso native then played at DII Western New Mexico University, where the Mustangs won the Rocky

Mountain Conference championship in 2008, '09 and '10, reaching the NCAA final eight in 2011.

All that is very good news for the Bronco squad.

"I'm very pleased we were able to fill some of the big shoes we just lost with somebody of equal caliber who has a good background in tennis and is an alumnus of the school," said athletic director Jose Barron. "I'm very excited to have him on board."

Dominguez is equally excited to be back at his alma mater.

"My experience here at NMMI remains one of the best times ever, so coming here is really an honor," he said. "I'm happy to be back here as a staff member and I'm going to do my best."

The coach will be working with O'Connell for a week or so while he learns the ropes, and hopes to learn from Lady Bronco head coach Dan O'Connell as well.

"I'm going to try to learn as much as I can from what he does, then try to make the program into my own," he said.

Dominguez only met his team for the first time Monday afternoon, but from what Dan O'Connell told him, he's excited about his new charges.

"I think I've got a good group of kids, and Dan's trying to get a couple more kids coming in for the spring, so I think we'll have a strong team," he said.

And Barron thinks the school has a good coach.

"He brings a lot of historical knowledge about the program and a lot of the expectations in many regards with him. And, of



course, the program will be his and he'll be able to give his own spin to it."

Dominguez, O'Connell and both Bronco squads will see their first fall action Sept. 3 and 4 at the 18th annual Southeastern New Mexico Open at Cahoon Park.


Former New Mexico Military Institute multi-sport star **Roger T. Staubach 1962 JC** was inducted into the NJCAA Hall of Fame® today. The Cincinnati, Ohio native came to NMMI to help him prepare for entry into the United States Naval Academy. He was a one-year student during the 1960-61 school year, a private in the 1st platoon and 2nd squad of Company G, and he participated fully in the NMMI Corps of Cadets, all while playing three officially sanctioned junior college sports: football, basketball, and baseball.

In football, he quarterbacked the team to a 9-1 record. Roger set the school record for passing yardage in a single season with 1,294, throwing for nine touchdowns, then ran it in for nine more.

In basketball, he averaged 12.4 points per game, helping the team to win the first-ever title for the newly established Western Junior College Athletic Conference. Staubach also pulled down 119 rebounds during the season, which included a 12-game win streak.

On the diamond, Staubach played centerfield and hit .324 for the Broncos. This star athlete made several relief appearances on the mound, helping the squad to a 16-4 overall record. A 14-game winning streak was snapped in the sectional finals with a 6-2 loss to Paris Junior College – a win would have meant a birth to the NJCAA World Series.

Following his time at New Mexico Military, Staubach completed his legendary collegiate playing career at the U.S. Naval Academy. In 1963, he led the Midshipmen to a historic season that culminated with the No. 2 ranking in the nation. Staubach was recognized as the best player in the country with the Heisman Trophy, Becoming the first former NJCAA studentathlete to receive the award. By the end of his senior season, the star quarterback set a new school record with 4,253 yards of total offense. Navy retired Staubach's No. 12 jersey at his graduation ceremony in 1965, and he was later inducted into the College



Football Hall of Fame in 1981. Despite being drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in 1964, Staubach fulfilled his military commitment including a one-year tour of duty in Vietnam where he served as a Supply Corps officer with 41 enlisted men under his command. Staubach returned to the United States in September 1967 where he finished out the remainder of his naval career.

Staubach joined the Cowboys in 1969 and assumed the full-time starting role at quarterback during the 1971 season. After taking hold of the reins, he led the Cowboys on a run to their first championship with a 24-3 win over the Miami Dolphins in Super Bowl VI. Throwing for 119 yards and two touchdowns, Staubach became the first Heisman Trophy winner and first former NJCAA student-athlete to be named Super Bowl MVP. After throwing for career highs in completions, yards, and touchdowns during the 1979 season, Staubach announced his retirement. He was inducted into the Dallas Cowboys Ring of Honor in 1983 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1985.

After his retirement, Staubach displayed the NJCAA ideals of volunteerism and service through his dedicated contributions to programs supporting individuals and communities. He founded Allies in Service which serves as an outreach program to veterans to provide support

in employment, housing, education, and health care. Staubach is also active with the United Way of Metropolitan Dallas and the Catholic Charities of Dallas. In 2010, he received the Hope for Humanity Award from the Dallas Holocaust Museum/Center for Education in Tolerance.

"When I called Roger to notify him of his induction into the NJCAA Football Hall of Fame he was humbled by the honor. He was so honored to have been chosen after only playing for New Mexico Military Institute, and in the Junior College system for one year, before being accepted to the U.S. Naval Academy. I assured Roger that it might have only been one year but that year left an indelible impression on NMMI and the NJCAA. COL Frank J. Oliveira, NMARNG 1985 HS-1987 JC

RIO RANCHO, N.M. - Family, friends, Soldiers and mentors witnessed and celebrated Col. Frank Oliveira's promotion to his present rank August 7, 2016 at the Rio Rancho Readiness Center.

The silver eagle epaulettes were placed on the shoulders of his Class B uniform by his wife Shawna "Curley" and his daughter Casey "Sase." His mother Natercia Varley pinned the new rank on Oliveira's beret. She, accompanied by her husband, retired U.S. Air Force Lt. Col. Donald Varley, traveled from the Sacramento area for the ceremony.

"It was a great experience to have Mom here for this one," Oliveira said. "She was the one who pinned me when I was commissioned a second lieutenant, but has not been able to be there for my other promotions."

Also in attendance were Secretary of Veterans Services, BG Jack R. Fox, NMARNG (Ret) 1966 HS-1968 JC and wife Marvine, and retired U.S.

Army Lt. Col. Tony Pino and his wife Debra. Oliveira, who worked for both gentlemen as a troop leadership advisor at New Mexico Military Institute when Fox was commandant of cadets and Pino was deputy commandant, calls both great mentors.

Oliveira said he always wanted to be like his mentors. "Their rank never defined them; it's their character that defines them," Oliveira said. "They are men of character and I always try to emulate that. I am honored that they were able to be here."

Fox reminisced about the time he was awakened at 4 am at NMMI because there was a fire in the barracks.

"Low and behold, it was in my troop," said Oliveira with a chuckle, but remembers he was not very happy then.

"And Lt. Col. Pino calls me Colombo," Oliveira said. "During winter time, I wore a long black trench coat and anytime he had something for me, I always took out my pen and notebook to take notes... a good habit I picked up when I worked for the Roswell Police Department. So the name stuck."

"He is a very humble man," he said of Pino. "In Vietnam, he and his fellow Soldiers took enemy fire while crossing a river. As bullets rang out, he thought 'I am not going to die in this river,' so he got up and led the way by charging back out and firing on the enemy - earning a Silver Star."

Oliveira said that never in his wildest dreams thought he would get this far because early in his career, all he wanted to do was serve his eight year obligation and get out as a captain. "It's humbling and an honor to be standing here 30 years later in front of my family, special guests and the Soldiers, NCO's and officers that had something to do with me getting here."

Oliveira attributes his success to his approach to leadership and says he strives to set the example. "I always treat others with respect, no matter who they are, " he said. "I genuinely care for the welfare of others and I treat them the way I want to be treated."

When asked about what his wife Curley thought about his promotion, she said, "Frank, it's about time. I knew you had it in you," he said with a chuckle. "And my daughter Sase, in her own words said, "I am very happy for you; way to go, you big lug."

With over 30 years of service in the New Mexico National Guard, Oliveira plans to retire next May and transition to civilian life. Until then, he is focused on leading the G1 Personnel office and set the best course of action for the organization.

Colonel Allen J Lovelace, age 84, went to be with his Lord early in the morning of August 21, 2016, after a battle with bone cancer. He was born on May 5, 1932, in Krum, Texas to Charles Carlton and Beatrice Inmon Lovelace. Allen grew up in Carrollton, Texas, graduating from Carrollton High School. Allen then attended North Texas State University, receiving a bachelor's degree in biology with a strong minor in chemistry. He served three years in the United States Army as a photographer. After his military service, Allen returned to North Texas State to complete his work toward a master's degree in biology and education. During this time, he met the love of his life, Caroline Cole. After Allen and Caroline graduated, they married and became a truly united couple for 58 years.

The couple relocated to Roswell, New Mexico, where Allen began a long career at New Mexico Military Institute, teaching biology for 36 years and eventually [auth] becoming the head of that department. Many cadets still recall his humorous ways of relating biology concepts to them. During his years at NMMI, Allen had a summer occupation which utilized his broad knowledge of biology, working with a crop inspection agency that advised local farmers what, if any, pest-control treatments their crops required. A lifelong Methodist, Allen was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Roswell for 57 years, where he often taught junior high or adult Sunday school. His love of music was evident by his lively participation in both the chancel choir and the Silver Chords music ministry. He also had a special interest in the Monday Morning Men's Prayer Breakfast, which he attended faithfully. Allen was a member of The Gideon's International and helped distribute many Bibles throughout his years as a member.

As might be expected of someone with his background in biology, Allen kept an immaculate yard and grew beautiful roses each summer. He loved chess, playing tournaments both in person and via the mail. He was also always ready for a game of Mexican train dominoes. A big supporter of NMMI basketball, he also thoroughly enjoyed his Texas teams of the Dallas Cowboys, the Texas Longhorns, and, later, the Texas Tech Red Raiders. Some of Allen's last words came as the family watched a Dallas Cowboy pre-season game, when, though he had not been able to communicate for hours, he suddenly asked plainly, "What's the score?"

Allen's love of family always came first. He is survived by his wife and Christian helpmate, Caroline Cole Lovelace. Together, they touched the lives of NMMI cadets and many others with their prayers and ministry to those in need. He is also survived by his daughter, Patty Lovelace, and his son, Ben Lovelace, both of Roswell; they will be forever grateful for his Christian influence in their lives. Also surviving Allen are his three grandchildren, whom he adored, John Lovelace, of Albuquerque, Josh English, of Roswell, and Carrie Dillard, of Amarillo, Texas. Survivors also include Allen's brother and sister-in-law, Charles and Nancy Lovelace, of Garland, Texas; his sister and brother-in-law, Ann and Danny Andersen, of Duncanville, Texas; niece, Lynn; nephews.
