On March 11, Dr. Villtchinskaia took eight cadets to New Mexico State University to attend the 2023 Chemistry Olympiad Rio Grande Valley Local Section. They competed against southern New Mexico and west Texas schools on individual written tests, team forensic labs, individual titration labs, and team qualitative analyses. The cadets were placed into the General Division and the USNCO (United States National Chemistry Olympiad) Division based on their experience.



# **Early Commissioning Program**

In 1911 the first cadets to receive commissions as second lieutenants in the Army at NMMI were Eugene Lohman of Las Cruces, New Mexico, and Mord P. Short of Como, Mississippi. Five years later, Senior Reserve Officer Training Corps was established at New Mexico Military Institute on December 3, 1916.

In 1965 the Military Science Department commissioned the first and second lieutenant under the Army's Early Commissioning Program (ECP), 2LT Patrick H. Orell. New Mexico Military Institute ROTC continued to make history in 1997 when the battalion was named the best ROTC battalion in 4th Region ROTC by winning the Macarthur Award. In 2007 US Army Cadet Command



recognized the NMMI Army ROTC ECP as the most improved military school ROTC program in the country.



Over the decades, NMMI ROTC has produced thousands of Army Officers, and the squadron is consistently one of the top producers of second lieutenants in US Army Cadet Command.

Soldiers and Officers passing through NMMI ROTC and JROTC programs have been recognized for their valor, and many former Cadets have risen to become flag officers.

During Winter Graduation in December, NMMI commissioned 2LT Zephan Leya, who is currently finishing his baccalaureate in Flordia. This May, during Spring Graduation, NMMI will commission twenty 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenants with an additional six upon completion of Cadet Summer Training at Fort Knox, KY.

Since 1984 NMMI has commissioned 1314 Second Lieutenants.

# NMMI Music Program participates in Music Festival

The NMMI Music Program recently traveled to Randolph-Macon Academy in Front Royal, Virginia, to participate in the 45th annual military school festival. This Festival is a three-day event that brings together military schools from across the nation to form a combined concert band and concert choir, and drum majors train together under the direction of the United States Navy's Drum Major. Conductors are invited from the active duty ranks of our armed forces to clinic and lead these ensembles through a professional process of rehearsal that culminates in a performance after two days of extensive and intense rehearsal. Students audition for placement in the concert band and the choir, and auditions determine solo parts during the performance.

The NMMI music department was by far the most decorated department of any military school in the nation this year. Our NMMI concert band earned the following honors: First Chair in the Clarinet Section, First Chair in the Tenor Sax Section, First Chair in the Tuba Section, and runner-up in the Drum Major Competition (losing by only half a point). The NMMI Band was awarded **Ronald Horton Award** for best prepared HS Band and the **Herbert Day Award** for best prepared College Band.

The NMMI choir also earned an impressive number of awards: Best in Section Award for the Altos, Best in Section Award for the Tenors, Best in Section Award for the Basses, and top vocal award for being the Outstanding Vocal Musician of the Festival. In addition to these awards, 5 cadets successfully auditioned to earn a solo part. The NMMI Music Program greatly benefited from this experience and looks forward to attending next year's event.

# Cadets enjoy Philmont Scout Ranch

NMMI's Venture Crew 30 took advantage of Philmont Scout Ranch's "Winter Adventure" program. Crew 30, led by Cadet Molly Ryan from Prescott Valley, AZ, spent 3 nights and 4 days in the Southern Rocky Mountains near Taos. The Crew snowshoed their way to camp while dragging sleds of gear and tents.



They tested their ability to camp in the wilderness while dealing with the cold weather, snow, and plenty of wind. Through the weekend, the temperatures dropped to 11°, and the wind gusted up to 90 MPH. At times heavy snowfall caused white-out conditions.

Though the weather was not cooperative, a few breaks in the snowfall and high winds allowed for sledding, exploring the wilderness, and an epic snowball fight. The crew also had an opportunity to learn about rock climbing and tested their skills in

an indoor "bouldering gym."

As a bonus, LTC Arthur Houghtby, Deputy Commandant of Support and primary sponsor of Crew 30, finally achieved his five-year-long dream and made this opportunity a reality for these gritty cadets. CPT Lynn Doherty, '94JC, Foxtrot Troop Leadership Advisor and Co-Sponsor of Crew 30, also supported and achieved her first official patch as a Crew 30 adult advisor.

Venturing is a youth-led Boy Scouts of America program about building and leading adventures. It focuses on developing skills like leadership, event planning, organization, communication, and responsibility while enjoying the outdoors.

Historically, NMMI has a long tradition of involvement with BSA (Boy Scouts of America), and even the Crew 30 designator has significance. In the BSA's early days, councils assigned numbers to new troops numerically. The first troop in a council was Troop I, the second was Troop 2, and so on. Being assigned Crew 30's designation goes back to the beginnings of the Conquistador Council to which they belong.

# Endowment Funds

NMMI Foundation manages donor endowments. These designated funds can provide scholarships, offset operational costs of programs/events, and create faculty continuing educational programs.

By choosing to create an endowment you have made a commitment to support present and future NMMI cadets, faculty and staff. Our goal is to ensure that you are able to do this in a way that the fund meets your wishes, helps those you intend it to help; and does not add any stress throughout the process. A couple of things to think about when determining if this is the route you want to choose:

- \$10,000 is the minimum requirement to create an endowment.
- Once the funding is received it is invested and, after 12 months, earnings are generally available for spending purposes.
- The Foundation spending policy provides an annual spending percentage from the endowment fund (currently 4.0%).
- A criteria must be put into place that allows for determination of who or what program would be able to receive the funding.

# Forchtner selected as Two-Year College Rep on AVCA Board

Broncos head coach Shelby Forchtner was recently selected by the American Volleyball Coaches Association as the new Two-Year College representative on the AVCA Board of Directors.

"I'm honored to be asked to represent the two-year colleges for the AVCA," said Forchtner. "I'm looking forward to doing my part to help our community of coaches."

Missouri State University-West Plains volleyball coach Paula Wiedemann on the board. Forchtner has been serving on the AVCA's two-year college head coaches committee for the past several years.

With the new position comes new responsibilities, like running various monthly and annual meetings and keeping the junior college volleyball world informed of any important news. Forchtner will serve alongside representatives from the NCAA divisions, NAIA, beach volleyball, high school, and club.

"The AVCA is basically the umbrella over all levels of volleyball," Forchtner said. "In a role like this, you get to touch every level of the game and help grow the sport. Volleyball's popularity is on the rise, and I think there's always room for more growth."

During her 17-year tenure at the Institute, Forchtner has compiled a head coaching record of 431-229. Forchtner led the Broncos to the regional postseason every year and qualified for the national tournament eight times in the past 10 years. The 2021 season had no postseason, but the Broncos finished 8-2 in conference play. The Institute finished as the national runner-up in 2021.

As a player, the Roswell native was a standout for the Goddard Rockets and then attended Seward County Community College, where she played for a conference championship team in 2000, earning All-Region honors. She went on to play for Lubbock Christian University, helping the Chaparrals make the national tournament in 2001.

After graduating from LCU, Forchtner returned to Roswell as a volleyball assistant in 2003 and was named head coach in 2006.

The AVCA was established in 1981 with the mission of advancing the sport of volleyball with coaches at the epicenter of leadership, advocacy, and professional development. Among the nearly 7,000 members include coaches from the collegiate, high school, club, youth, and Olympic levels. The AVCA provides education to coaches, recognition of elite players and coaches, promotion of volleyball competitions throughout the world, and networking opportunities for volleyball products and service providers.
