Robert W. Kurrle, Jr. 1998 JC Commander, United States Navy (Retired)

Robert Kurrle, Jr. came to New Mexico Military Institute as part of the United States Naval Academy's prep program in August 1997. He enjoyed cadet life playing on the Bronco tennis team, making the Dean's List, and was on his way to graduating junior college in the Class of 1999 when he was accepted to the United States Naval Academy in June 1998. He graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 2002.

Kurrle spent his entire career flying Naval aircraft in both peacetime and as a pilot and senior leader in a front-line FA-18 combat squadron. He served as Flight Student, FA-18 Strike Fighter Tactics Level III Instructor Pilot, VFA-34, FA-18FRS Instructor Pilot, and VFA-106 where he instructed pilots and navigators in all phases of the FA-18 training syllabus. In September 2009, he was selected to be a Blue Angels' Pilot and Training Officer for the United States Navy Blue Angels'. The Blue Angels' team has the goal to inspire a culture of excellence and service to country. They began in 1946, and the team has the honor of representing the hundreds of thousands of men and women who serve in the United States Navy and Marine Corps to audiences both at home and abroad, showcasing the excitement, precision, and power of Naval aviation. This precision flying team performed for more than 22 million people throughout the United States. He served as a demonstration pilot; and in addition served as an instructor pilot for the new Blue Angels' pilots. He was also responsible for the airborne safety at each airshow they participated in.

Kurrle also attended the Naval Post Graduate School in Monterey, California, receiving dual master's degrees - the Executive Master of Business Administration and the Master of Arts in Security Studies - both in 2013. He also holds a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering from the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland.

Kenneth McCoy 1990 JC

Kenneth McCoy came to New Mexico Military Institute in August 1988. He flourished in cadet life, following in his father's footsteps and completed his first class year on the Regimental Staff graduating in 1990.

McCoy is a decorated hero, famous in the field of law enforcement. He is recognized nationally as a visionary for his work reforming policing practices in ethnic communities, and improving public safety through diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI); building relationships with local communities, and guiding teams and organizations with diplomacy, dignity, and fairness. McCoy has helped transform many departments nationwide. He was the first African American Chief of Police of Anchorage, Alaska, and he now serves as the Chief of Police for Tempe, Arizona.

During a time of national crisis, McCoy has emerged as one of the nation's top leaders in law enforcement and public safety, rising to the top position in two major metropolitan police departments. His professional experiences demonstrate his prominence in designing programs, policies, strategies and initiatives that promote rapid crisis management and emergency response, and a positive culture of accountability, transparency, and inclusivity.


McCoy is a United States Army veteran who served 10 years in the Alaska Army National Guard and was honorably discharged as a Captain in 2000. In addition to being a New Mexico Military Institute graduate, he has a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from the University of Alaska (Anchorage) and a certificate in leading Diversity from the University of Virginia Darden School of Business. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and the FBI National Executive Institute. Being chosen to attend the FBI Academy is an honor that is highly competitive and stands as the pinnacle of law enforcement education. Few officers get chosen for this honor, let alone twice, demonstrating that McCoy is rarefied among the absolute best in the nation. When McCoy speaks, he always acknowledges New Mexico Military Institute's role in making him the man he is today.

James M. Raymond 1953 HS -1955 JC

James (Jim) Raymond came to New Mexico Military Institute in 1949. He enjoyed cadet life and graduated from High School in 1953 and Junior College in 1955. Raymond began his career in the oil and gas industry shortly after graduating from McMurray University in 1959. He worked for Shell Oil in California in the mid- '60s specializing in land lease signing for oil drilling all over the country. While there he became an off-road racing enthusiast winning trophies and becoming enamored with the sport. Raymond went on to establish Jeep Clubs, including the "WayWeGo's" and the "Gully Hoppers" and still attends their jamborees. Raymond is regarded quite highly by colleagues and competitors alike for his forthright and honest dealings in the oil and gas industry of Texas. Raymond has also been a founding sponsor of the New Mexico Military Institute Alumni ATV Adventure currently in its third year. Raymond has also participated in livestock shows and auctions. He has supported 4H and both his sons are active in it as well. He is famous in his local area for anonymously supporting livestock shows, hospital equipment and school upgrades; along with supporting other community needs. His independent spirit and gregarious love of other people have made him a hero to many youth he has mentored along the way. Raymond has shown unwavering support to his Alma Mater. He was a key sponsor

He also annually supports the General's Cup Golf Tournament for cadet scholarships. 
