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



Suddenly, a pair of headlights emerged, followed by a booming "Hold it right there!"

Busted? Not quite. It turned out to be a park ranger, a former NMMI sergeant with a soft spot for pyrotechnics (in his youth, of course). He confiscated the "educational materials" but, impressed by Fiona's creativity (and maybe a touch of nostalgia), offered her a deal: a supervised fireworks display on Independence Day. Fiona, grinning like a firecracker about to ignite, readily agreed. Spring break might not have been a beach getaway, but Fiona got her explosions after all.



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This sunbathing picture was definitely taken in the Spring, mid to late 70's, though I can't honestly say it was actually during a Spring Break. I was never caught, and incidentally, in the five years spent there, I ne-v-e-r walked one tour. I was as wild as the next, but in my case, no Tach Officer could ever catch me doing something wrong, LOL! I did spend a Spring Break or two at the Hill, rather than going back home to Louisiana, so sure.... these events c-o-u-l-d have happened during Spring Break. Just sayin!!

There was Miguel "Speedy" Gonzales, the wisecracking speed demon with a beat-up Toyota pickup he affectionately called "La Cucaracha." Then there was Beatrice "Buzz" Rodriguez, the tactical genius with a knack for hotwiring anything with a pulse. Joining them were the twins, Marco and Maria Ramirez, masters of disguise and purveyors of dubious gadgets from their basement "Mad Scientist Lab."

Their target? Not some dusty battlefield, but Roswell's infamous Area 51. Legends whispered of aliens, government conspiracies, and technology beyond imagination. Armed with Buzz's meticulously planned infiltration route (complete with strategically placed cow carcasses), Speedy's La Cucaracha (modified with the Ramirez twins' "super-duper muffler" to avoid detection), and a backpack full of questionable gadgets, they set off under the cover of a star-dusted night. The desert stretched before them, a vast canvas punctuated by cacti and the occasional tumbleweed.
