



LEGACY AT NMMI

Honoring the Past, Shaping the Future

Legacy at NMMI is more than just a connection to the past; it's a living, breathing tradition. For legacy cadets, the link to the Institute runs deep, not only because they follow in the footsteps of their parents or relatives but because they are actively shaping NMMI's future. This bond goes beyond the halls and uniforms, it's a shared understanding of values, discipline, and honor.

At NMMI, legacy cadets are celebrated for their unique connection to the Institute. The Alumni Relations Office hosts a special dinner each semester to honor these cadets and their families, recognizing the lasting impact of multi-generational ties to NMMI.

Voices of Legacy Cadets

This is what several legacy cadets had to say about their experiences and how their family history has shaped their time at NMMI.

Cadet Octavian Chavez, a senior and First Sergeant of Bravo Troop, shared how his father's role at NMMI inspired him to reach similar heights. "When my father was at NMMI, he was First Sergeant. That motivated me to achieve the same goal. I'm proud to say I realized that during my senior year." Cadet 1SG Chavez is now headed to West Point, furthering his education and leadership development.

Cadet Valeria Hererra, whose family has a long history at NMMI, reflected on the pressure that comes with being a legacy cadet. "It feels intense, there's an expectation set, and standards set. That at times can be very overwhelming." Despite this pressure, she is driven by a sense of duty to uphold the traditions of her family. She expressed that her father and brother both went through NMMI and learned a lot from their experiences. One thing they passed down was a deep respect for NMMI's standards, especially the tradition of not tolerating dishonorable behavior. Cadet SGT Hererra also sees her role as more than just continuing a family tradition. "We have a role to uphold higher standards. It's our job to show compassion, help fellow cadets, and set an example for those who come after us."

For Cadet Mia Martinez, the connection to NMMI runs even deeper. "I feel proud to follow in my dad's footsteps. He taught me everything I needed to succeed as a RAT before matriculation. He taught me how to square my corners, the Goss Quote, and how to properly address superiors." This mentorship from her father made her transition to NMMI smoother and instilled in her a strong sense of discipline. "I believe Silver Taps is one of the most important traditions at NMMI," Cadet 1LT Martinez added, referring to the solemn event where cadets and alumni honor fallen comrades. "It brings cadets and alumni together and allows them to grieve the loss of the fallen alumni together. I think this tradition should be carried on for many years to come so everyone can honor the alumni we've lost and feel that sense of unity."

Both Cadet 1LT Martinez and Cadet SGT Hererra spoke on their independent decision to attend NMMI regardless of their family's influence. They recognized the value of NMMI. Cadet 1LT Martinez shared, "I was a RAT in August 2022, and I chose to come here because it was something different. My dad being an alumni helped with my decision, but it was not the deciding factor. I liked how different NMMI was, and I wanted to try something new. After my time here at the institute, I plan on going to college to study political science and law."


