


From the Director's Desk

FROM CADET TO COMMANDER: LTC KARL HARNESS RETURNS TO LEAD NMMI'S EARLY COMMISSIONING PROGRAM

Lieutenant Colonel (LTC) Karl Harness's journey with the New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) began with a simple spark—an NMMI marketing card in his high school JROTC classroom in Riverside, California. Inspired, he applied to just one school: NMMI. From 1998 to 2000, LTC Harness attended NMMI's Junior College, where he earned his commission as a Second Lieutenant through the Early Commissioning Program (ECP). More than 27 years later, he returns to Roswell as the newly appointed Professor of Military Science (PMS), ready to lead the program that launched his career.

A Journey Rooted in Discipline and Service

After commissioning through ECP, LTC Harness continued his education at the University of California, Fullerton, graduating with a degree in Communications. He credits NMMI with equipping him with the discipline and time management skills that carried him through college, military life, and leadership.

Over his distinguished 27-year career in the U.S. Army, LTC Harness has served at fourteen military installations across the globe. Among his many assignments, two stand out: his first deployment to Iraq with the 2nd Cavalry Regiment, where he participated in the Battle of Sadr City in 2004, and his tenure as a Company Commander with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment (ACR) at Fort Irwin, California.

At every stop along the way, his NMMI class ring was with him. Inspired by a story once told to him by COL Seth Orell, USAR-NMMI alumnus and former Commandant of Cadets-about the ring's deep symbolism of commitment, pride, and legacy, LTC Harness has worn his ring daily saying, "It's been to more countries than most people ever see."

Leading the Charge: A Vision for ECP

As head of NMMI's Early Commissioning Program –one of only four such programs in the nation–LTC Harness is tasked with developing tomorrow's military leaders. The ECP offers cadets a unique opportunity: earn a commission as a Second Lieutenant in just two years.

LTC Harness brings a renewed focus on leadership development, NMMI traditions and customs, and professional readiness to the role. His vision for the program is to create future leaders who are lifetime scholars, soldierathletes, and warriors with a competitive edge over their peers.

Since returning on post, he's already begun implementing his vision: strengthening mentorship programs, emphasizing military customs and courtesies, and reinforcing the importance of officer readiness from day one. His leadership is grounded in NMMI's core values –Duty, Honor, Achievement–and a clear vision for producing officers who are not only tactically proficient but also ethically grounded and intellectually agile.

Back on Post, Still at Attention

Though much has changed at NMMI since the late 1990s, LTC Harness sees the institute's enduring spirit wherever he turns. The sound of Reveille, the mission to create future leaders, and the powerful lifelong bond between cadets remain timeless.

Back on the Post where his military career began, LTC Harness is eager to connect with alumni and channel their experiences to inspire today's cadets.

His message to current and future cadets is simple but powerful: Embrace every challenge. Lean into Duty, Honor, and Achievement. NMMI offers a foundation unlike any other. It's a great place to start your military journey—and build the future you want.

Each year, the New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) Annual Fund helps carry forward a proud tradition of academic excellence, discipline, and leadership. The Annual Fund allows alumni, parents, and friends of the Institute to invest directly in the Corps of Cadets and the programs that define the NMMI experience. Gifts to the Annual Fund are unrestricted, meaning they go where needed most, from scholarships and academic innovation to leadership development and historic Post preservation. These contributions ensure that NMMI can adapt quickly and continue to provide a world-class, value-driven education to each new generation of cadets.

One example of your Annual Fund gift in action is the Alumni Heritage Tradition Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to cadets who are direct descendants (parent/grandparent attended NMMI) of active alumni. An active alumnus is defined as one who contributes \$100 or more annually to the Annual Fund or a designated fund. Cadets who qualify for this scholarship can receive a \$500 scholarship.



NMMI offers various scholarships based on merit, need, leadership potential, academic achievement, and more. In addition to merit-based and need-based scholarships, cadets may qualify for state and federal aid programs, including SROTC scholarships. This can offset the cost of attending while providing a clear pathway to a military career.

Participation at any level matters. The impact of scholarships is only possible through the generosity of donors who believe in the NMMI mission. When you give to the Annual Fund, you invest in people, programs, and traditions that shape tomorrow's leaders. Your support ensures NMMI's legacy endures.






